### **LET'S SET SOME GROUND RULES**

Broaching topics about LGBTQ people may lead to discomfort and disagreement. Here are some best practices for students:

**RESPECT** another person's right to have opinions and thoughts that are different from yours.

**BE OPEN** to considering alternative thoughts, ideas, opinions and behaviors. Be willing to "try on" new ideas, or ways of doing things that might not be what you prefer or are familiar with.

**SAY OOPS** and, or acknowledge when you may unintentionally say something and wish you had not.

HAVE A HIGH SENSITIVITY level to the feelings of others.

**USE "I" STATEMENTS** Each person's learning is enhanced when we share our own experiences and speak from a personal perspective.

**NO REPRESENTATIVES** Don't expect a person to represent all persons in their group. Do not speak for a whole group or express assumptions about the experience of others.

**UNDERSTAND THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN INTENT & IMPACT** Try to understand and acknowledge impact. Denying the impact of something said by focusing on intent is often more destructive than the initial interaction. (Example: *He didn't mean anything bad by saying "that's so Gay"*)

## WHAT IS 'QUEER'?

QUEER is an umbrella term for people who don't conform to cultural norms around gender and/or sexuality. It's also a term used to express that sexuality and gender can be complicated and change over time.

Originally meaning 'strange' or 'peculiar' the word "Queer" was historically used to put down or disrespect LGBT people. But more recently, many LGBTQ+ people use the word with pride to identify themselves. So don't call someone "Queer" unless you know they're cool with it. The best thing to do is ask what labels people prefer.

### WHAT IS INTERSECTIONALITY?



**Intersectionality** is a term initially coined in 1989 by Dr. Kimberlé Crenshaw to highlight the compounding impact of racial and gender discrimination on Black women. It describes the balance between merging identities and the singular lived experience that comes as a result.

Intectionality refers to the simultaneous experience of social categories and the ways in which these categories interact to create systems of oppression, domination, and discrimination.

In other words, Crenshaw's intersectional theory asserts that people are often disadvantaged by multiple sources of oppression: their race, class, gender identity, sexual orientation, religion, and other identity markers. Intersectionality recognizes that identity markers (e.g. "woman", "black" and "gay") do not exist independently of each other, and that each informs the others, often creating a complex convergence of oppression.
